

Indigenous and non-Indigenous people come together to defend the fragile ecology of the Kosciuszko National Park in the Australian Alps, after a decade of drought followed by the catastrophic fires of 2019-20.

ABOUT THE FILM

Listed as a national heritage area in 2008 the Australian Alps is the birthplace of some of our iconic rivers.

The trampling of hard hoofed animals is endangering the headwaters of the Murray and Murrumbidgee Rivers and the threatened native species of plants and mammals that live in this unique and sensitive habitat.

A law protecting feral horses in Kosciuszko National Park and the ongoing impacts of climate change are taking their toll.

Where The Water Starts reveals how these challenges are seen by Indigenous and non-Indigenous people who were born or live in the southern mountains, or who care deeply about it.

THE ISSUE

- It is estimated over 14,000 feral horses in the park are threatening the survival of 23 native plant species and 11 native animal species.
- Australia's alpine and sub-alpine terrain is extremely small amounting to 0.01 percent of our inhabited continent, the driest one on earth, yet it contributes almost 30% of the Murray-Darling Basin's water.
- Despite its significance as a water supply feral horses are degrading the headwaters of these major rivers, 'like elephants in stilettos'.

'The land has it's own voice if only people would stop and listen.'

The film brings together respected Aboriginal community leaders as well as business people, a local farmer, a scientist, a former parks officer and an academic.

It explores our shared colonial and Indigenous histories and identities.

Revealing the beliefs of its core interviewees, it focuses on the themes of caring for Country as a shared responsibility of all Australians; that the best of Aboriginal connection and the best of regenerative science can work together for a better future for the alpine environment and the planet.

The film is at Post Production stage. We're inviting donors to help to complete the film.
